

Point of Entry Manual

The purpose of this Point of Entry Manual (POEM) is to facilitate collaboration among the agencies responsible in the transition service planning for children with disabilities. It should be utilized while addressing instruction, community service, other post school adult living objectives, functional vocational evaluation, related services, employment objectives, and acquisition of daily living skills in Individual Educational Plan development, and is designed in a directory format for easy use by the individuals responsible for planning transitional activities. This document will be reviewed at least annually for updated information.

- Meets or makes arrangements for self-care needs
- Have third party fee sponsorship (ability to pay for services)
- Willing to follow established work rules, e.g. drug free work-place, etc.
